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ABSTRACT

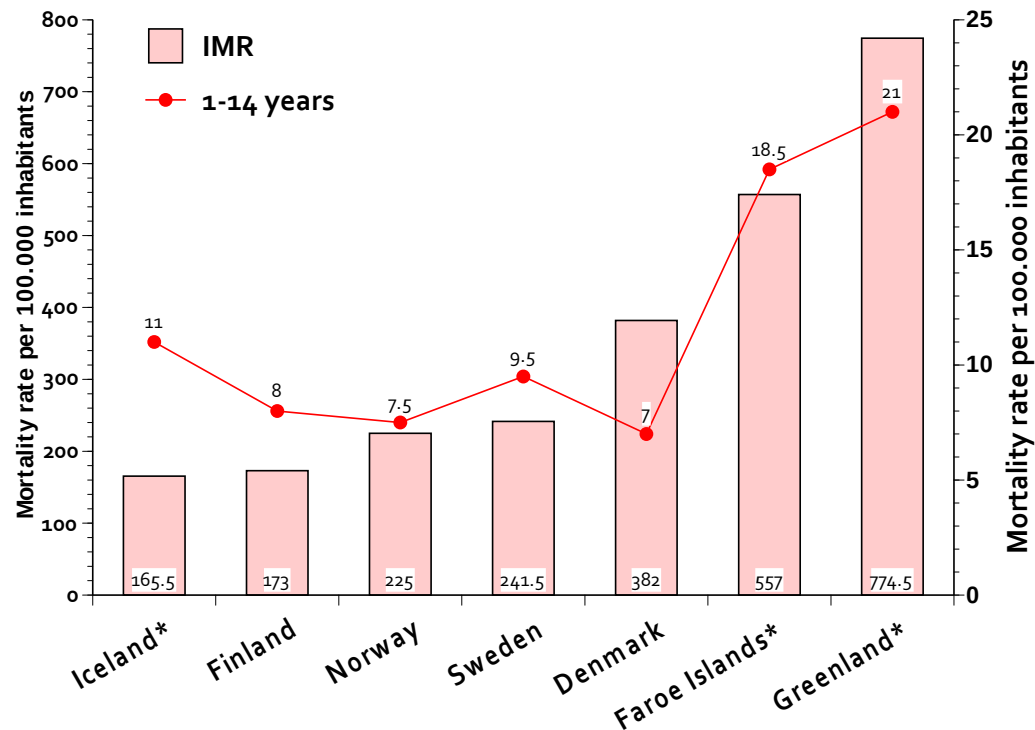
Aim: This review examined and summarised the research published on child abuse in Iceland, which was mainly in the country's native language, to make the findings more accessible to English speakers. It specifically focused on child rearing and the physical, emotional and sexual abuse, neglect and intrafamilial conflicts suffered by children at the hands of their parents and other carers.

Method: The review drew on published research, books and reports and compared the findings with Nordic research and global estimates of child abuse.

Results: Qualitative and quantitative research revealed that the prevalence of different forms of child abuse, child neglect and intra-familial conflicts in Iceland was similar to, or higher than, global and Nordic estimates. Younger respondents reported less physical abuse than older respondents, but higher levels of emotional abuse. Legislation, greater awareness, public debates and research on child abuse in Iceland have contributed to the growing recognition of the negative consequences of child abuse and strengthened support for prevention strategies.

Conclusion: Icelandic children have reportedly experienced diverse forms of child abuse and neglect from their parents and other carers. Diverse initiatives have been put in place that underline the urgent need to tackle such behaviour.

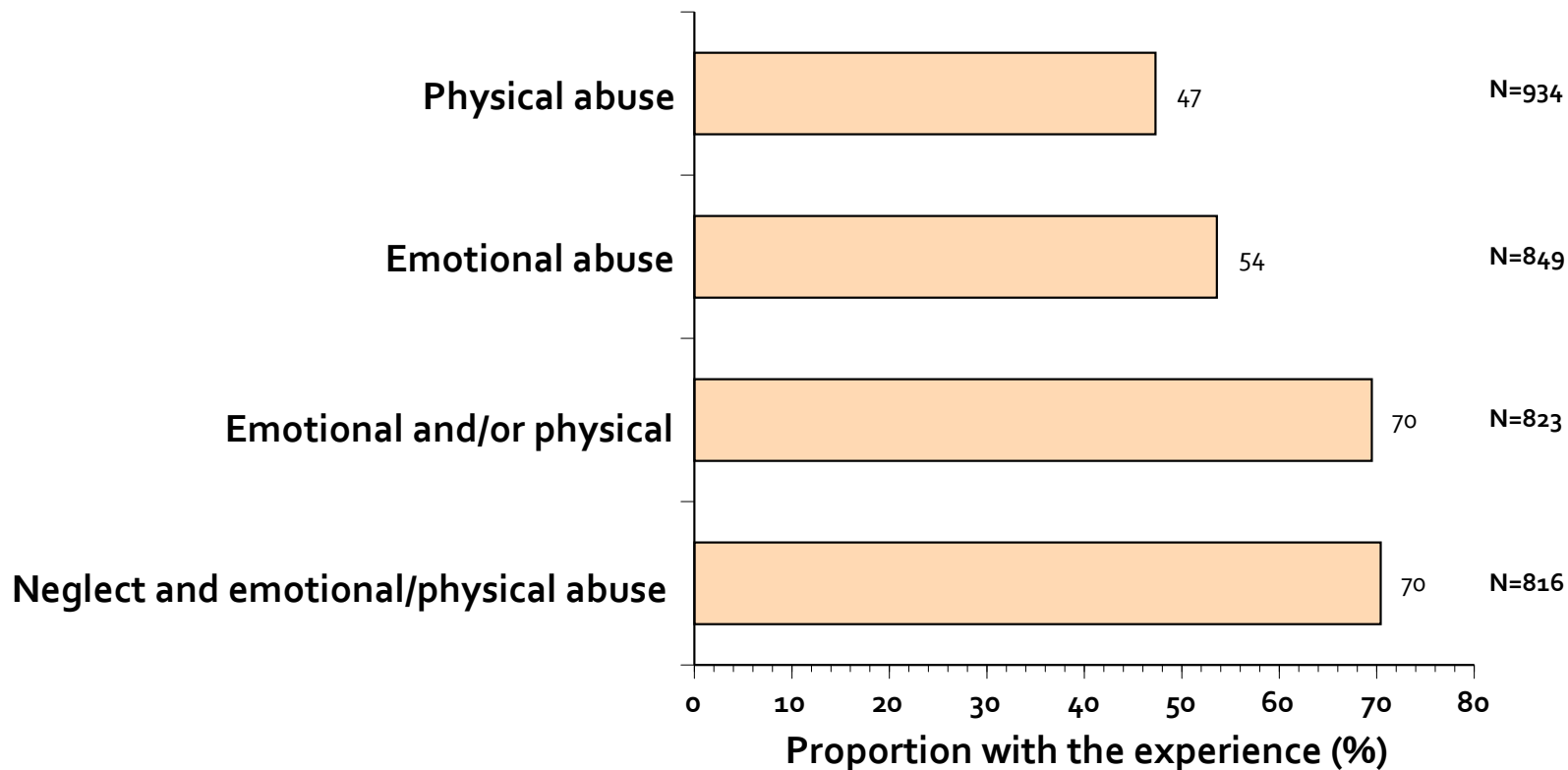

Recall by randomly selected group of adults (2010)

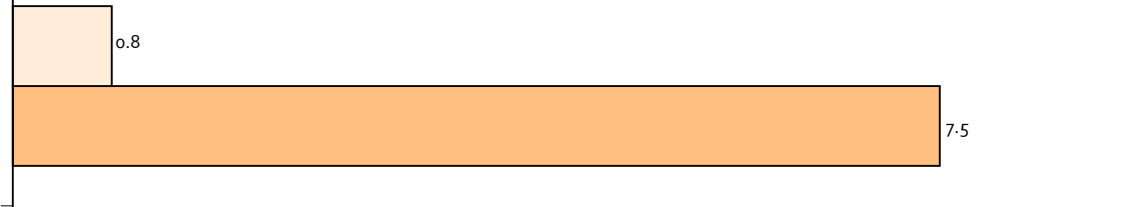


Sexual abuse 16-19 years of age (2004)

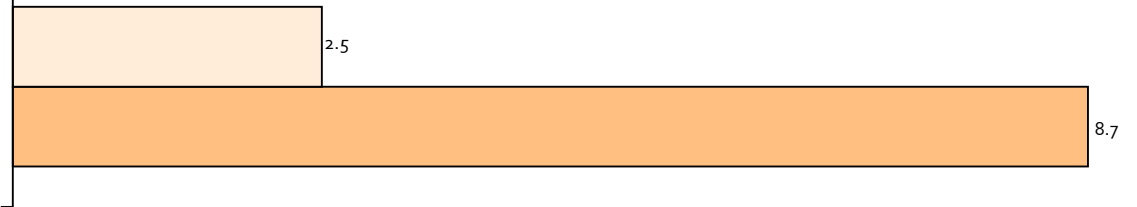
Someone exposed his/her body against his/her will



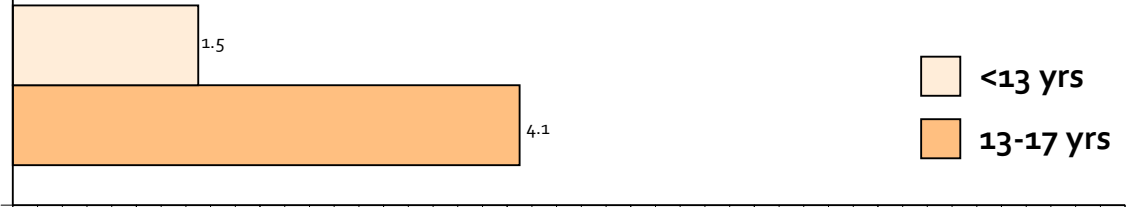
Someone touched one's body against his/her will

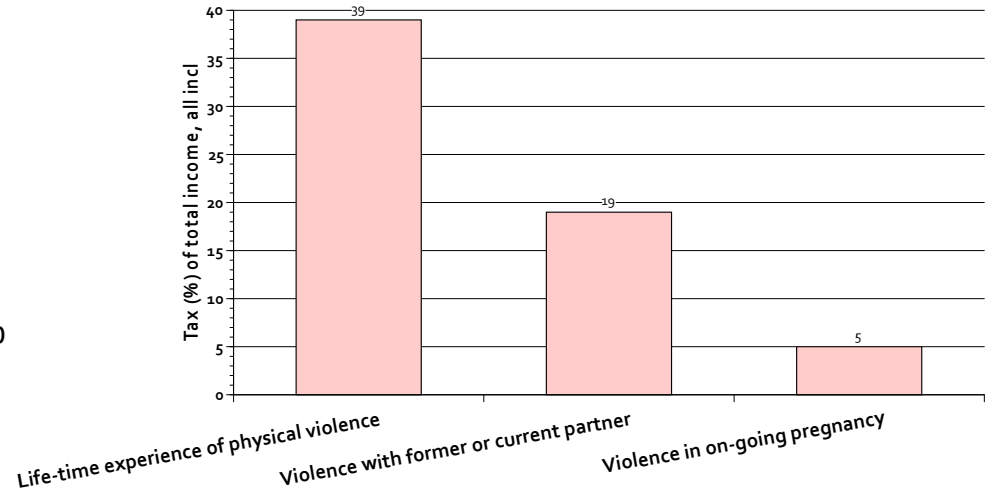

Intimate partner violence (IPV) in Iceland

- **Quantitative studies**

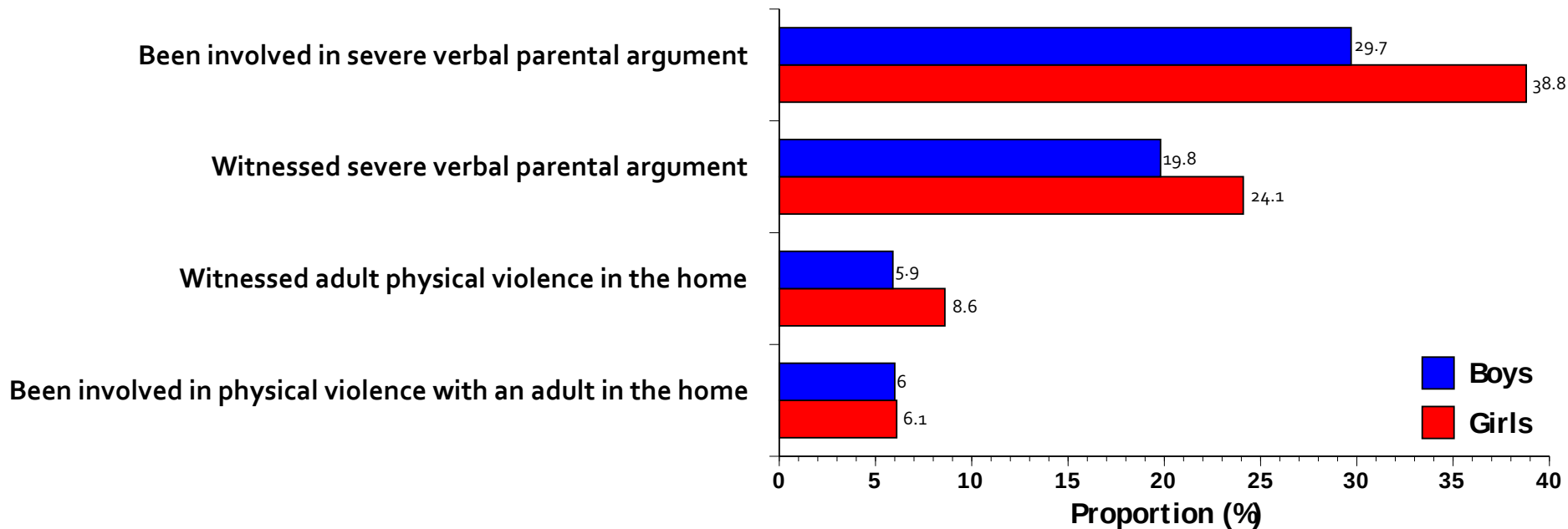
- In 1996
 - 3.000/74% response rate
 - 13.8 of women and 3.9% of men with experience of IPV
- In 2006
 - 7.613 women 18-67 yrs in sample/36.1% response rate
 - 10% with experience of IPV



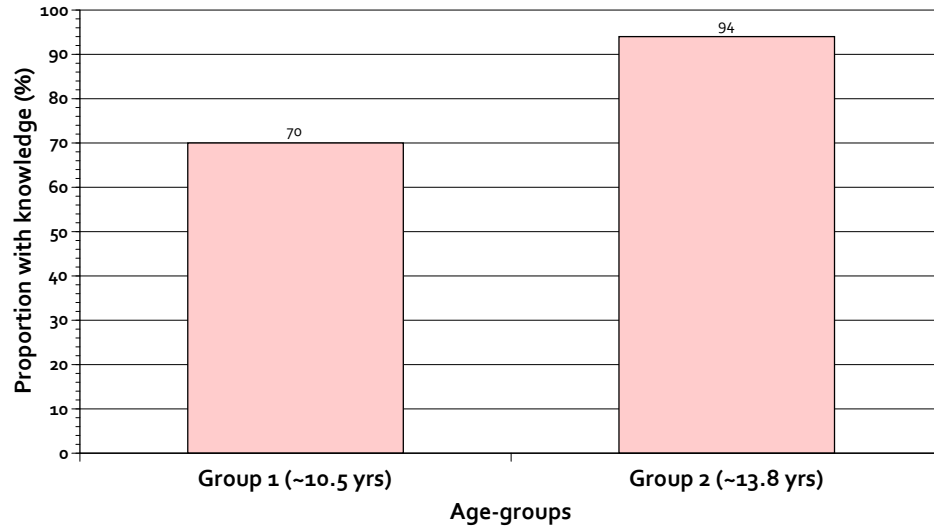
High risk pregnancies
107 out 110 took part in 2006

Intrafamilial conflicts in Iceland

Adolescents 14-15 years (2003)



Children's knowledge of *domestic violence*



13 primary and secondary schools

N=1125 participants; 68% response rate

- Quarter of the participants knew someone who had been a victim
- Qualitative interviews
 - Dominant feeling of the children with the experience was fear, anger and distress
 - Teachers were not prepared to help

Other initiatives

- **A policy against abuse of children (2012)**
 - Unicef and Save the Children together with
 - Child Protection Authorities, Barnahús, Faculty of Social Work, Directorate of Health, National Hospital, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Welfare, Police, Primary Health Care Services, Children's Ombudsman, State Prosecutor
 - Red Cross, Heimili og skóli (Home and School), Kvinnathvarfið (The Women's Shelter), Stígamót - Education and Counseling Center for Survivors of Sexual Abuse and Violence, Verkefnastjórn gegn einelti (Against Bullying), Blátt áfram (Straight Forward)
- **Working group: measures against sexual abuse, harassment and digital sexual violence (2018)**
 - Ministry of Justice

Conclusion

- **Convention on the Rights of the Child**
 - all children should be protected from violence
 - have the right to enjoy a childhood that is free of abuse
- **Prevalence of child abuse and neglect in Iceland**
 - similar to, or slightly higher, than for the Nordic countries, and similar to, or lower, than global figures
- **Increased general understanding of the problem at hand**
- **Preventive actions are ongoing**
- **Lack of intervention studies**
